

Editorial:

The Church in Bangladesh started the New Year with great hope and optimism and new vigor. The Annual Assembly of the Episcopal Bodies took place in the beginning of the year where the members of the Episcopal Commissions expressed their commitment to extend their service to the Church and the Faithful from their respective areas. The pilgrimage of the Bishops to the Rajshahi diocese brought great encouragement to the Faithful and vivified the caring gestures of the pastors of the Church. The blessing of the new Cathedral of Sylhet expressed the solid foundation of the faith of the diocese and a sign of the Ecclesia, the Assembly of the faithful. The arrival of the World Youth Day Cross boosted the joy of the youth and the excitement, enthusiasm, and the devotion of the youth as well as the Faithful in general witness the deep religious sentiment.

We pray that God the Father will bless us with another Shepherd in the Universal Church in the likeness of Jesus, and together with our Local Shepherds, we will resume our pilgrimage towards our heavenly Jerusalem.



The pilgrimage of the bishops to the Diocese of Rajshahi

The bishops of the CBCB made a joyful and blessed visit to the Diocese of Rajshahi from March 7 to 9, 2025. The pilgrimage sought to deepen the connection between the faithful and the bishops, celebrating the Jubilee Year.



On March 7, the bishops started their journey from the CBCB Centre after the Annual General Assembly of the Episcopal Bodies. They reached the Bishop's House of Rajshahi diocese in the evening. The Bishop's House Community warmly welcomed the bishops as well as Monsignor Abel Toglo, the newly appointed Secretary of the Vatican Embassy and Fr. Belisario Ciro Montoya both of whom joined the bishops there.

On the following morning the bishops celebrated the Holy Mass together at and after the breakfast, all started the journey towards Joypurhat. The first stop of the pilgrimage was at Saint John Bosco Church in Lokhikul, where the faithful greeted the bishops with flowers, songs, and a vibrant welcome dance. Archbishop Bejoy N. D'Cruze, OMI of Dhaka shared his appreciation, saying, "We bishops are pleased with the sincerity of Father Emil Ekka, the parish priest. Many people have come to know Jesus through your work."

As the delegation continued their journey to Christ the King of Peace Church at Chandpukur they were met with warm hospitality from the priests, nuns, and parishioners, who greeted them with the traditional Santali dance and floral tributes. Fr. Bablu Corraya the Parish priest delivered a welcome speech, sharing the history of the Church there.

Among other places of pilgrimage were the parishes of Khonjonpur, Bhutahara and Katadannga. In every place the bishops met with the boundless joy and excitement of the Faithful with their warmest welcome ceremonies along with their pastors and Religious communities.

Bishop Ponon Paul Kubi, CSC, the Secretary General of the CBCB expressed heartfelt gratitude, saying, "I sincerely thank Bishop Rozario for organizing this pilgrimage. It has been a unique gift from God, and I feel fortunate to visit this place."

Monsignor Toglo, marking his first visit outside of Dhaka, expressed deep appreciation for the pilgrimage, saying, "I am pleased to be in Rajshahi Diocese. Through this visit, I have seen the realities and struggles of Christians here. I feel incredibly lucky to witness this experience."

Bishop Gervas Rozario thanked all for making the visit happen and noted, “it is a blessing and a source of inspiration and encouragement for the faithful of Rajshahi.”

The remarkable pilgrimage left a lasting impact on the faithful of Rajshahi, highlighting the deep connection between the Church leadership and the communities they serve. The visit also reinforced the message of unity, love, faith and hope the Jubilee Year.

CBCB Meeting: March 5-6, 2025

The First CBCB Meeting was held on March 5-6, 2025 with the participation of all the bishops. Following are some of the salient issues discussed in the meeting:

a) II International Congress on the Pastoral Care of the Elderly and the 5th World Day of Grandparents: It was informed that the 2nd International Congress on the Pastoral Care of the Elderly to be held in Rome from 2-4 October 2025. Theme of the Congress is: “Blessed are those who have not lost hope” (cf. Sir 14:2). It will be organized by The Dicastery for Laity, Family and Life. Bishops discussed about the possibility of assisting some grandparents to attend the program and asked the EC-Laity for necessary cooperation in this regard.

On the other hand, the 5th World Day of Grandparents will be held on 27 July. The observation of the day aims to be an opportunity to reflect on how the presence of grandparents and the elderly is a sign of hope in every family and ecclesial community. A message from the Holy Father will be published and some pastoral tools will be provided. Bishops emphasized on the effective observation of the day in all the parishes and institutes that serve the elderly.

b) Uniformity in Bann writing form and the marriage certificate: Bishops noted that sufficient numbers of new Marriage Certificate and Bann Writing forms are to be printed for all the dioceses. Bishops asked Bp. Subroto B. Gomes to help in checking and finalizing the materials.

c) Interreligious Dialogue Program: It was informed that the visit of His Eminence Cardinal George Jacob Koovakad, the Prefect of the Dicastery of Interreligious Dialogue as well as the Interreligious program had to be postponed due to the month of Ramadan. The revised proposed schedule is September 5 to 12, 2025. Archbishop Lawrence S. Howlader, CSC, the Chairman of EC-CUIRD asked for the co-operation and participation of all the bishops in this program.

d) Special Study Program (SSP Course): It was informed that the participants of the SSP Course have enrolled for the Honors Course at Siddheswari College in Dhaka. It was decided that the SSP Course is to be continued till April 11, 2025. Bishops also proposed that each diocese would host the SSP Course in turn and would provide for its director, such as: Rajshahi (2025-2026), Mymensingh (2027-2028), Dhaka (2029-2030).

Bishops maintained that the propaedeutic study would be for one full year after completion of the board exams and it would be effective from 2026.

Annual Assembly of the Episcopal Bodies 2025



The annual Assembly took place on March 7, 2025 at the CBCB Centre with the participation of all the bishops and the Secretaries/ representatives of each Episcopal Commissions and Desks. The Assembly commenced with a prayer and words of welcome by Most Rev. Bejoy N. D' Cruze, OMI, the President of the CBCB who highlighted on the theme 'Pilgrims of Hope' and invited the members to be the pilgrims of hope and spread hope through the activities of the Commissions.

There are 16 Episcopal Commissions and a number of Desks belonging to this Episcopal Bodies. The annual activities and plan for the new year of each Commission were presented with challenges faced and solutions envisioned. After the presentations of the Reports there were the discussions on some important and general issues such as the meaningful arrangement of liturgy, focus on migrated community, Church's concern for the changing saturations of the country, the arrangements of programs and participations in the Jubilee Programs etc.

It is worth mentioning that the EC-Health Care had initiated the translation of **The New Charter for the Health Care Workers** in Bangla. The Commission has printed as book and it was officially inaugurated in the Annual Assembly.

All the participants expressed their commitment to serving the cause of the CBCB and for the good of the Church in Bangladesh through the activities of the Episcopal Commissions renewed in hope as they are in this great year of Jubilee.

Inauguration of the Divine Mercy Cathedral, Sylhet

The Divine Mercy Cathedral of the Diocese of Sylhet was solemnly inaugurated on the 22nd of February, 2025 in a festive celebration. The longtime dream of the believers of Sylhet diocese to have their own cathedral finally came true after 14 years of the erection of the diocese in 2011. Thousands of faithful, clergy, and distinguished guests gathered in the premise of the Bishop's House of Sylhet and participated in the historic occasion.



Archbishop Kevin S. Randall, the Apostolic Nuncio of the Holy See to Bangladesh, graced the event as the chief guest, along with Archbishop Bejoy N. D'Curze, OMI, the Archbishop of Dhaka and the first bishop of Sylhet, who had a great collaboration towards building the cathedral. The opening ceremony was further honored by the presence of His Eminence Cardinal Patrick D'Rozario, CSC and other bishops of the Catholic Bishops' Conference of Bangladesh.

The event commenced with a solemn Holy Mass offered by Archbishop Bejoy N. D'Curze, OMI during which Bishop Shorot Gomes led the blessing of the cathedral and as the prayers and hymns echoed through the newly built Cathedral, the faithful joined in deep reverence and gratitude.

Archbishop Randall explained the significance of the cathedral and said, "This cathedral is not just a structure; it stands as a testament to the unity, faith, and service of the Christian community. It calls upon us to keep our hearts open to the Lord."

Archbishop D'Cruze remarked on the cathedral's role in spiritual and social upliftment, emphasizing that "This magnificent place of worship will not only serve as a center of faith but also foster education and social service among the community."

Following the inaugural ceremony, a special reception was held in honor of the guests, accompanied by a vibrant cultural program featuring musical and dance performances by local Christian youth and children.

The event was a joyful celebration of faith and togetherness, with participants expressing their gratitude for the realization of the long-awaited cathedral. The inauguration of the Divine Mercy Cathedral marks a new chapter in the spiritual journey of the Christian community of the diocese of Sylhet.

National Youth Day (NYD) of the Jubilee Year-2025

Episcopal Commission for Youth (EC-Y) organized the National Youth Day (NYD) 2025 along with the Youth Jubilee at Don Bosco School & College, at Utrail, Durgapur under the Diocese of Mymensingh from 26 February to 2 March 2025 with the theme: "Youths are Pilgrims of Hope". With the spirit of communion, participation as well as youth pilgrimage of faith sharing, celebration, formation, transformation and mission of the youth, the NYD 2025 witnessed the gathering of the hundreds of the youth full of vim and vigor. The presence of His Excellency Kevin S. Randall as a chief guest, amplified



the joy of the participants. Most Rev. Bejoy N. D'cruze, OMI had a wonderful presentation on the main theme. Most Rev. Subroto Boniface Gomes was given a warm reception as the newly appointed chairman of the Episcopal Commission for Youth.

Some 447 youth, 34 Priests, 27 Religious Brothers and sisters from different Congregations, and a good number of Volunteers, Animators, Committee Members, and Secretaries of the National and Diocesan Youth Commission from 8 different Dioceses- altogether around 557 participants joined the NYD this year. The four day long program was adorned with warm reception with cultural dance and songs, opening of the Jubilee Holy Door, installation of youth cross, opening Mass, sessions and workshops on different topics, cultural rally, half day exposure, heritage corner, venerating of Youth Cross, park of forgiveness, meditation, daily prayer and Mass, quiz, animations, group discussion, evaluation, action plan, cultural show, closing ceremony and mission oath. These programs inspired the youth to be effective catalysts and outlet for this desire to serve by offering mission trips, projects and other approaches as instrument for learning the broader aspects and to have a personal and living encounter with Jesus Christ. This pilgrimage flourished youth to restoring a climate of hope and trust as a prelude to the renewal and rebirth. The NYD concluded with a renewed and refreshed spirit, with openness of hearts towards the future and a flavor and fragrance of the great Jubilee.

The Holy Spirit Institute of Theology – A New Departure

On 26 November 2024, a historic milestone was marked for the Catholic Church in Bangladesh with the official establishment of the Holy Spirit Institute of Theology (HSIT) in Dhaka by the Dicastery for Culture and Education, Vatican, Rome. This new institution has been granted a five-year period of experimentation (*ad quinquennium experimenti gratia*) and is now affiliated with the Faculty of Theology of the Pontifical Urbaniana University.

This significant achievement coincides with the Golden Jubilee (1973–2023) of the Holy Spirit Major Seminary (HSMS), which has, over the past 50 years, served as a vital center for integral formation, with a special focus on intellectual formation in the priesthood, religious life, and the laity. The launch of HSIT represents both a continuation and a transformation—offering a specialized philosophical and theological education now distinct from the administrative framework of HSMS.

According to Article 8, no. 8.1 of the Statutes of HSIT, the governance of the Institute is entrusted to several key bodies:

Moderator: The Bishop of the Archdiocese of Dhaka, where the Institute is located, serves as Moderator (no. 8.2).

Governing Board: Chaired by the Moderator, it includes the Archbishop of Chattogram, Bishops from Dinajpur, Khulna, Mymensingh, Rajshahi, Sylhet, and Barisal, the Rector of HSMS, the Director of HSIT, and Major Superiors of congregations contributing significantly to the student body.

Director: Responsible for overseeing the academic life and progress of the Institute.
Institute Council: Comprising all permanent teachers, two non-permanent teacher representatives, and two student representatives, ensuring broad participation in academic decision-making.

The Holy Spirit Institute of Theology aims to provide rigorous academic programs in philosophy and theology, open to a diverse body of students including seminarians, religious brothers and sisters, and laity. This inclusive and scholarly environment is designed to cultivate theological depth, spiritual maturity, and critical engagement with the challenges of contemporary faith and society.

The establishment of the HSIT marks a new chapter for theological education in Bangladesh, solidifying its connection to the global Church while addressing the growing local need for a structured and autonomous theological institute. As the Catholic Church in Bangladesh looks ahead to the future, the HSIT stands as a symbol of faith, growth, and academic excellence—a testimony to the vision nurtured over the past five decades at the Holy Spirit Major Seminary.

Fr Victor Sagayam, SVD shared on Pilgrims of Hope in the context of South Asia: Shattered hope due to the challenges and struggles of the socio-political and economic conditions and Dei Verbum and other Papal Documents related to the Word of God and how are they applied in the context of South – Asia shared by Fr Yesu Karunanidhi, Executive Secretary of the CCBI Commission for Bible. At the end of the Assembly, participants took the action plan that in this Jubilee year of Dei Verbum sub-region will provide stipend for bible scholars to promote higher education for those who are unable to go abroad.

Caritas Bangladesh marked the World Day of Prayer and Awareness against Trafficking in Persons on February 9, 2025, at its central office in Dhaka. The event, themed “Ambassador of Hope: Together Against Human Trafficking,” was attended by Director, Finance & Administration Mr. Remi Subash Das, Director, Programs Mr. Daud Jibon Das, sector heads, managers, and other staff members. The program featured prayers, reflections, and messages from key officials. Pope Francis' message on human trafficking was shared, along with insights into the life of St. Josephine Bakhita, the patron saint of trafficking survivors. Staff members joined in collective prayers for victims, reaffirming their commitment to fighting modern slavery.

The World Youth Day (WYD) Cross in Bangladesh: a blessed moment for the Youth and the Faithful



The Church in Bangladesh, “the Little Flock” had a rare and blessed occasion to welcome and venerate the World Youth Day Cross and the portrait of Mother Mary accompanying the cross. As the WYD 2027 is to take place in Seoul, South Korea and as customary, the Cross along with the icon of the Blessed Virgin is taken to the different countries. With the invitation of the Local Organizing Committee (LOC) of Seoul, the Episcopal Commission for Youth first applied to the Archbishop Seoul to send this WYD Cross to Bangladesh

to have pilgrimage for the youth. The joy of the Youth and the Faithful of the country overflowed when Bangladesh finally received the Youth Cross on March 27, 2025.

The deep and strong devotion, love and faith of the youth towards the cross was truly astonishing. The Youth Cross pilgrimages to some parishes in Dhaka, Chittagong Rajshahi and Dinajpur have deeply touched the hearts of thousands of the Christians and the youth. Nearly 15,000 young people and Faithful took the opportunity to touch the cross, spend time in silence, to pray and kiss it. This grace filled occasion endowed the youth with great hope to encounter Christ and experience God’s love and mercy.



This historic and blessed event will definitely have a lasting effect and will be cherished in the minds and lives of the thousands of the youth and Faithful in Bangladesh.

Significance of the World Youth Cross:

The World Youth Cross is a very ordinary wooden piece made by a pike tree. Its size is 380 cm × 176 cm × 25 cm and its weight is 40 kilogram. It was first installed by Pope John Paul II in St. Peter's Basilica in Rome in 1983 on the Jubilee Year of Salvation and as “a symbol of Christ’s love for humanity”. The journey of the cross began in 1984 when Pope John Paul II called on young people to Rome and gave them the cross, saying, “Carry it throughout the world and bear witness to the love of Christ.” Since then, the World Youth Cross has traveled from country to country, from generation to generation,

carrying the message of God's love for humanity. Through this cross, countless young people have regained the light of their lives and have tried to dispel the darkness of the world with that light. Through the touch, prayer, and love of countless young people around the world, this very ordinary wooden cross has become extraordinary and a symbol of strength and hope for young people.

Portrait of Mother Mary accompanying the cross:

Just as Mother Mary traveled with her son during the suffering of Jesus Christ, she also witnessed and endured the immense suffering of her son and gave her the courage to walk that path for the benefit of humanity. Similarly, the icon is “a sign of Mary’s motherly presence close to young people who are called to welcome her into their lives.” The portrait of Mother Mary is carried with the World Youth Cross so that she can give courage, inspiration, and strength to all the young men and women to carry the cross of their lives.



PMS USA Team Visits Bangladesh



From 10 to 14 April 2025, a team of four members of the Pontifical Mission Societies USA visited the Catholic Church in Bangladesh. The visitors were Msgr. Roger Landry, The National Director of PMS USA, Ms. Inés San Martín, The Vice President of Marketing and Communications, Ms. Margaret Murray, an office staff and Fr. Tri Tang Pham, pastor of the Holy Family

Parish in Port St. Lucie Florida. H. E. Kevin Stuart Randall, The Apostolic Nuncio in Bangladesh was very kind to invite his friend Msgr. Roger who in turn gave his consent to visit the country with his team. The National Direction of PMS Bangladesh in collaboration with the Apostolic Nunciature thoroughly arranged the visit in different places in the country. Archbishop Randall, his Secretary Fr. Belisario Ciro Montoya and Fr. Peter Chanel Gomes, the National Director of PMS Bangladesh always accompanied the PMS USA team during the four-day visit.



Dates and places of the visit: The team started the visit on the 10th of April joining the Chrism Mass early morning at St. Mary's Cathedral and eventually met the Archbishop of Dhaka. Afterwards, they visited the migrant workers' place located in Bagori, Madanpur, Bandar Narayanganj. The Apostolic Nuncio arranged a dinner cum meeting of all bishops and PMS USA team at the Nunciature in the evening. The meeting of bishops with the team was very fruitful and eye-opening for the both.

On the 11th of April, the team went to the Diocese of Khulna and visited several places around the Bishop's House. Accompanied by Most Rev. James Romen Boiragi, they went to Khalishpur Parish to visit a girls' hostel which PMS USA supported to renovate. Afterwards they visited Mujgunni Parish, Bethany House and MC Sisters' House at Sonadanga and finally housing project at Mariapolli under Bagerhat Parish. In the evening the team reached the Bishop's House of Barishal Diocese.

On the 12th of April, accompanied by Most Rev. Emmanuel K. Rozario, the team visited the Cathedral, The Mother House and Novitiate of LHC Sisters and then the church and The MC Sisters' House at Golpukur. Then the team visited Gournodi, Ghorarpar and Baniarchor parishes under Barishal Diocese. After a late lunch at Baniarchor, the team returned to Dhaka.

On 13 April, the last day of the visit, the team attended the Palm Sunday Mass at Holy Rosary Church at Tejgaon. Afterwards, they visited Bottomley Home Orphanage and met the children who are always supported by PMS. They also visited the Holy Spirit Major Seminary at Banani and had lunch with the major seminarians and seminary staff. At the request of Fr. Charles Gordon B. CSC, the Pro-Vice Chancellor of NDUB, the team also paid a visit to Notre Dame University Bangladesh in the evening and had a short meeting with the University Admins.

Aim and impact: The aim of the visit was to experience the faith and growth of the Catholic Church in Bangladesh despite her difficulties and back draws, to learn how the generous sharing of the Catholics in one place can raise up the conditions of their brothers and sisters in another place. This visit will certainly open doors to solidarity, support and cooperation between the Catholics of the two countries.
